FISCAL NOTES

ONE-TIME PASS-THROUGH FUNDING – FY 2022 and FY 2023

- A. <u>Federal ARPA (American Rescue Plan Act) Funding</u> \$92,100. Half of the funds were received in Summer 2021; the second half was received in June 2022. A portion of the funds has been used as follows: (1) \$895.00 was used for a second treatment to eradicate a North Main Street infestation of Tree of Heaven; (2) \$3000.00 was used as the Town's cost share to fund a required Town audit, which was largely paid by DE Division of Public Health/ODW; and (3) \$5000.00 was paid to consulting firm GPI to produce a traffic assessment for Thorn Street.
- B. <u>Magnolia Volunteer Fire Company (MVFC)</u> purchase of new mobile command unit truck. Funding had been provided through Community Transportation Funds (CTF) as earmarked by State legislators in the amount of \$69,700. Truck was received, final payments were made, and the Town was subsequently reimbursed in full by DE Dept of Finance and DelDot from CTF funds.
- C. <u>Water Tower Planning Project</u> DE Division of Public Health / Office of Drinking Water approved funding of \$100,000 to initiate planning and documentation for a new proposed 100,000-gallon elevated water tank to replace the existing and aging 50,000 gallon water tower. The funding is a 50/50 cost-share arrangement whereby the Town will use \$50,000 of Capital Improvement Fund money secured for us by former Senator Colin Bonini over two years ago and the State of Delaware will match that with another \$50,000.
- D. <u>Wells Rehab Project</u> DE Division of Public Health / Office of Drinking Water had also greenlighted \$850,000 of funding to rehab the Town's two primary wells and pumps. Unfortunately, whereas ODW had initially indicated this would be a "forgiveness loan", at the last minute they reversed course and switched it to a standard 20-year interest loan. The Town does not have the revenue streams to support this type of arrangement without raising its water fees over 100%, so the Town was forced to decline this offer.
